

MAP 21 and Accelerated Project Delivery

MAP-21 will be implemented in a way that promotes better environmental outcomes, supports transparent, informed decision-making through:

- 1. More rapid schedules for permitting and licensing projects,
- 2. Better Process Management for the environmental review process,
- 3. Reduced Statute of Limitations timeframe for lawsuits and permit appeals, and
- 4. Use of administrative conflict resolution tools.
